**N36 degrees – 38.645’**

**W80 degrees- 38.237’**

**Oak Tree that is 37 inches in diameter with the top pointed toward the NE, Pictured with Brandy Puckett, KI4CPJ**



**N36 degrees 38.605’**

**W80 degrees 33.167’**

**Apple Tree uprooted in the Puckett’s front yard with top pointed South. The tree has been cut up to clear roadway.**



**N36 degrees – 38.609’**

**W80 degrees – 33.145’**

**Chestnut Tree in Puckett’s front yard twisted off at about the 15 foot level. Top pointed NE**

**W80 degrees – 38.237’**

**Wild Cherry Tree in Puckett’s Front yard with top pointed almost due north.**

**Oak topped at about 20 feet above ground with the top pointing NE**

**Wild Cherry with the top pointed toward the NE.**

**The Puckett farm is 2200 feet long and experienced damage over nearly the full length of the farm. Damage was intermittent with trees being downed and “topped” over a distance of a couple hundred feet and then there would be a strip for several hundred feet with no damage. The damage didn’t follow the terrain. Damage was often in low areas and “damage free areas” were on higher elevation in direct line of the forward movement and path of the wind.**
